



On the north wall can be found two memorial plaques remembering those of this village who gave their lives in the two World Wars, the WW1 plaque was refurbished in 2014. To commemorate the centenary of the start of WW1, in 2014 our village also raised the funds to unveil a war memorial on the village green to which a fifth WW1 name (Cpl. H. Sparke) was added.

*Corporal H. Sparke - 2<sup>nd</sup> Suffolk Regt. (Aged 21)*  
*Private J. E. Culling - 9<sup>th</sup> Suffolk Regt. (Aged 21)*  
*Private H. W. Gault - 8<sup>th</sup> Sussex Regt. (Aged 27)*  
*Private A. J. Smith - Machine Gun Corps. (Age unknown)*

1939 – 1945

*Sergeant D. W. Savoy - Wireless Operator RAF. (Aged 21)*  
*Sergeant G. H. Savoy - Flight Engineer RAF. (Aged 21)*  
*Private W. Middleditch - Suffolk Regt. (Aged 27)*  
*Trooper B. F. Talbott - Royal Armoured Corps. (Aged 29)*

*In a display case below the war memorial plaques is one of the 888,246 handmade ceramic poppies that filled the Tower of London's famous moat as part of the 2014 WW1 commemorations; each poppy represented a British military fatality during the Great War.*
